FREDERICK CARL FRIESEKE

was born in Michigan at Owosso, in 1874, and his remarkable success the past few years has been watched by the people of his native state with much pride. Still in the spring-time of his energy, recognition has come to him much earlier in life than to most painters. His early training was received at the Art Institute of Chicago, after which he took up his study in Paris with Benjamin Constant, Laurens and Whistler. He is one of the strongest American painters living in Paris, and his work abroad has been highly appreciated. Besides his numerous awards and his election as a Sociétaire of the Société Nationale des Beaux Arts, he is represented in the Luxembourg, Modern Gallery of Vienna, and Museum of Paintings at Odessa.

His own country has not been slow to recognize his merit, as many of the prizes, among them the Corcoran Art prize of 1908, and the Silver Medal of the Carnegie Institute, attest. He is represented in the Brooklyn Institute Museum, the Corcoran Gallery of Art, National Gallery of Art (Evans Collection).
